### Meitheal by Andrea Paul



ndrea Paul will be the curator of the annual group show of new work by current and former Signal staff, fondly referred to as 'The Meitheal'. As a non-Irish speaker, Andrea had heard several interpretations of this word, so she decided to look up the dictionary in an effort to pin down a meaning. She discovered that meitheal is the Irish word for contingent.

This was good news to her, as a contingent is understood to be a' representative group distinguished by common interests that is part of a larger group', and as such, she

wanted that this exhibition would be just that. This exhibition will be Andrea's first time to curate an exhibition of her colleagues work. The staff at Signal Arts Centre come from a range of artistic

disciplines and practices and work in a wide variety of media.

The work in this exhibition will include but not be limited to painting, photography, print making and ceramics. In creating a context for the presentation of the exhibition Andrea



thought it would be helpful to create a theme for the show. The theme she has chosen for this Meitheal is; The Natural World. In putting a theme before the artists she hoped it would provide cohesion to the show, while still allowing the artists' space for personal interpretation. She also wanted to offer the audience an entry point into their own interpretations and enjoyment of the works.

Andrea, however, discovered the foclóir also defined the word meitheal as a 'working party', which itself has the definition of 'a group of soldiers or prisoners assigned to some sort of manual task or duty'.

As she prepares to embark on the challenge of selecting the works for the exhibition she said, "Any rumours that the artists are locked in their studios until the works are ready, is categorically untrue!" The exhibition will open in the Signal Arts Centre July 20th 2015

### The Girl's Story by Eva Lindroos

he girl's heart is heavy. Mother is gone. Again. She left to fulfil the needs of another person whose needs always are more important. The girl is lonely again. Mother will come back. She knows that she will come back. She always does. But she has to go. Whenever, whatever is happening. Mother has to go.

The girl is used to waiting. It teaches her that waiting passively is more important than living. More important than going out to explore the world and coming back again, to mother. Coming back to share stories and learn about finding her place in the world. The girl is cold. The sharp winter sunshine has no warmth and the fire is not lit until 5. She is lonely. She gets used to waiting and to not getting to know her own strength and her own being.

When mother returns without a word but eyes full of sorrow the girl weeps silently in her heart. So this is the life of a woman she thinks to herself and she decides there and then that she does not want this life for herself. But she is fearful. She is afraid. She is terrified. Who is going to guide her and encourage her to trust her heart and her instincts. Her body and her wisdom. The girl is abandoned. Left to her own devices. To face the world.

She hears the voice of her father again. 'Oh, she is going to be all right that one. She is so strong willed. She knows how to cook so she'll find herself a husband. Somewhere in her heart a door closes. The pain is so intense. Father is not interested. She is only a girl after all and there are the brothers to attend to and their potential is so important.

When the girl leaves home at eighteen she is shown to the door by father. 'You are eighteen now. You need to leave and have your own life'. The girl is terrified. Who will teach her how to have her own life? How to find her way? How to survive? Mother is silent. She turns her back and she does not see or hear.

The girl realises that in mother's heart a door also closed a long time ago. And still mother does try to help. She sends her to the warriors with a letter. It is the only place mother knows that the girl will be taken care of. Somehow. 'Break her will, the letter says. Otherwise something terrible might happen. So I'm told'.

Many years later. Many loves later. Many meals, beautifully cooked meals, later the girl looks back and weeps for the two closed doors.

One door was opened though and the girl did go on her journey. She did all the things that mother was afraid of doing and more. Some of them she did even better than mother would have done them and the world did not come to an end. It was very frightening and she still did all those things, travelled all those roads and kept the door open in her heart and tended to her own garden. She became a mother herself.

When mother was old and struggled to cook all those meals every day she stopped one day and looked at her daughter. 'You are brave my daughter. I couldn't do what you have done. You went out into the world and found your own path. You have my blessing. Yes mother. We made different choices, the girl says.

The girl, the mother and somewhere in the back ground the great mother as well, listen. They hearstories about coming to oneself. In spite of it all. Somehow and at least trying...

The girl struggles to find the words to describe what is happening. She does not want to make it all nice again. Fix it all and pretend it didn't happen. In the end she realises that the girl and the mother both had opened that closed door and found different answers to the same questions. The girl feels the blessings that come to her and mother through the opened doors.... not perfect, not always pretty...but open...

Iggy Pop gave the 2014 John Peel Memorial lecture in London, and this is an absolute must for all artists, lovers of music, makers of music and for anyone who wants to make a difference.

One of the Godfather's of punk is in fine fettle, humane, funny, sensible, and engaging. The title theme is music in the digital age and the first catalyst of discussion was U2's free Apple download, but this covers so much more. An interesting history of Iggy's art, The Stooges, authenticity in art practice and basically trying to find and BE yourself, consistently. You'll have a spring in your step and a renewed attitude after seeing this; a real revelation.

### Recipe by Ciara Brehony

### Cannellini Bean Avocado and Mint Salad

ummer is upon us, which has us reaching for lighter, fresher fare. All summer, this salad is a regular in our house, both as a side dish for a light evening meal, or on it's own as a substantial lunch. The sharp, refreshing blend of lemon, garlic and mint combined with the creaminess of the beans and avocado make it a delicious, easy addition you can throw together in minutes.

### Ingredients:

2 x 400g cans of cannellini beans

2 large avocados

4 spring onions/scallions, sliced on the diagonal Good handful of fresh mint leaves, torn if very big

1 garlic clove, crushed

Zest and juice of 1 lemon

4 tablespoons of extra virgin olive oil

Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

Drain and rinse the beans and place in a bowl. Cut the avocados in half, remove the stones and spoon the flesh out of the skin. Slice lengthways and add to the bowl. Add the spring onions/ scallions, mint leaves, garlic, lemon zest and juice, and oil. Mix together and season to taste with salt and pepper. If it doesn't taste exciting, add more lemon zest, salt and oil. Enjoy!



### The Quite Girl Peter Høeg



or some time we've been getting into Scandinavian cinema and television, such as Headhunters. Borgen, The Killing and The Bridge, to name but a few. Intelligent and gutsy stuff. Prompted by that, my wife took this book out of the library and insisted I read it after her. I'm glad she

This is an amazing book. The author is doing new things with writing and this book would make an amazing film. It's certainly a thriller, but it's also

sensual, religious (Kasper often prays to 'She Almighty'), and quite visceral at times. It's also got loads of conspiracy elements with

comments on the artistic process and hints of corporate greed. The writing is top notch and the book is filled with witty random facts and pop culture references. What more do you want?

It concerns one Kasper Krone, a Danish circus clown who also has amazing psychic abilities, through being able to feel a person's vibrations, tone and essence of self (and often at a long distance), and a related, deep love and affinity with music. The story takes place around Copenhagen, and Kasper is in serious trouble, for tax evasion, among other things. He's on the verge of being extradited from Denmark when a small religious order offers to help intercede for him. In exchange for this, he has to look after a group of children with profound powers. Can the kids actually alter circumstances, or merely predict it? Then one of the children goes

The narrative has a great sense of reality to it, as it's often random and surprising, just like life. My only slight quibble is that sometimes the writing seems to get a little bit in the way, but this may just be an aspect of the translation. In any case, it's a minor complaint, and a fabulous read. It may take a little getting into, but it's worth it. Promise!

ad Max came to our screens in 1979, directed by George Miller and giving Mel Gibson cult status, looking back I remember thinking not bad not great but different.

In 1982 Mad Max 2 came along and was in my opinion the best of the three, Mad Max beyond Thunderdome in 1985 had its moments, so twenty years on George Miller brings us back to the post apocalyptic action.

After watching the trailers and the director talking

about how he made this movie I was impressed, owing to the fact all the stunts were done by stunt people and very little CGI was used was impressive to say the least, I do like Tom Hardy as an actor and Charlize Theron would be in my top 5.

Without giving the story or the plot away the first hour comes at you at 100 miles an hour, acrobatic stunts, explosions across the wide open spaces of apocalyptic Australia was very impressive and you get a feeling of the amount of effort and brilliant camera work that was involved in the making of this first hour alone, but as the film went on and the story line began to surface I couldnt help feeling I have been here before.

I have had some great debates with various people and only one person agreed he was as disapointed as I was, so to wrap it up, for the first hour alone its worth the entrance fee on the big screen but for the Mad Max purest you will be asking a few questions.

### Lifting the bell jar Sabine Weissbach



was born in Hagen, Germany. After my leaving cert I decided to study graphic design, a course I thought would accommodate my desire to create images. And it did for the first two years until the focus was entirely on the commercial aspect of design. I opted out and ran away with a one-man band... Yes!

What seemed to everybody else as a temporary bout of madness turned into a 15 year journey around

the world as a street performer that eventually ended in Cork around 20 years ago. I always wanted to be a painter but didn't think it could be a serious option. It took the drastic change into a nomadic life style and the escape from a so-called normal life



and everybody's expectations of what I should become. During my days on the road, living in camper vans, performing my musical puppet show on the streets I still carried my art supplies everywhere. Eventually I ended in a little cottage in North Cork where I spend all my days painting.

In 1996 I was offered my first exhibition in my hometown and after that nothing was more important than my artwork. I quit my life as a traveling performer, settled in Ireland and took



2007 I studied finally Fine Art at the Crawford College in Cork and graduated in 2011. A few months ago my life took another unexpected turn that landed me in the North East of England and I now find myself in a whole new chapter of my life. Curiously only a few months before that I had started to experiment with a new style in my work and the piece 'Waiting for her ship to come' was the first picture of this new series. It seems that accident and chance play

as much a role in my artwork as in my life.

Hoping for a beautiful outcome I follow a desire for something, a colour, an image, a shape, then focus on the process itself and make formal decisions along the way.

No matter what subject I choose, whether I work in a representational or abstract style I follow the internal logic of the picture itself until it reaches a stage where it feels

of the picture itself until it reaches a stage where it feels coherent and complete. Maybe Oscar Wilde was right when he stated 'Life imitates art far more than art imitates Life.'


