

'Safe Home' by Irina Kuksova



"I knew about 'Signal Open' since it started in 2013, but it took me 4 years to submit one and only piece a few days short of the deadline. The artwork is a portrait of my boyfriend Elliot, painted during my long recovery from a car accident. Entitled 'Safe Home', it speaks of what makes us feel safest in life – a cozy bed and a face of a loved one.

I have been painting since I was a kid and studied art in Moscow, Russia, then earned an Honours Degree in Painting from the Academy of Fine Art of Brera in Milan, Italy. Having moved to Ireland, I mostly worked in films (started as an extra and worked my way up to set design) and painted some commissioned pieces. As I was limited in job options after the car accident, I concentrated on personal non-commercial artwork, which I didn't have time to even think about for the last 10 years.

I was both surprised and delighted, when I heard my name being called to receive the 'Best in Show' Award. I'm forever grateful to Signal Arts for appreciating my artwork and – for the first time – making me an award-winning artist. "

he planning phase of Culture Night started in June by contacting various community groups and schools in the Bray area. Throughout the Summer Aoife ran some workshops with Little Bray Family Resource Centre and made umbrella jellyfish from found items, she also



ran a workshop making sea urchins for display on the night. All of the other groups worked on their own installations and it all came together beautifully on Culture Night, Friday Sept 16th.


As early at 8:30 am the first staff members arrived at Signal to get ready for the days tasks ahead, sealing off the parking spaces to allow room for the upcoming delivery of the art pieces made by local community groups and artists.

By 10am the installation began. Artwork from various groups and individual artists were placed along the Albert Walk; the Umbrella Jellyfish from the Little Bray Community Resource Centre, the sparkly mermaid and shark from Sunbeam House Services, Helen's amazing plastic decorations and all set off by Paul Flynn's beautiful large fish.

The team members installed smaller wooden fish, painted by Aidan and the impressive Merfolk Couple, made by Aoife and Greg, were installed opposite the Centre. Bray Tidy Towns displayed a large fossil like fish made from found items on the North Beach, a golden Neptune made by Carmona Services brightened up the entrance of Signal and the animated "I am not a fish" sculpture made by Dave Salmon (Christ Church Bray) was placed inside the building.

Our Mascot for this year's Culture Night was the absolutely magnificent Ollie the Octopus, who adorned the top of the building designed and made by Gill Cassidy, with help from various staff members and interns and installed by Nic and Brian.

By 2pm the children's entertainment started with Workshops run by Patricia and Mary, who made Cup Cake Liner Fish, for the younger crowd; Helen with Stephanie and Margret challenged the older children to try some origami shrimp. Andrea, Aidan





and Greg kept the children busy by using their individual talents to face paint fish etc. on the children. A large Mural, designed by Aoife and Andrea, was placed outside for all to have a go at painting in the Sea scape scenery. The Workshop and face painting was so popular that the team members had to do overtime. Eventually the Fancy Dress Competition was judged by Margret and her Jury team, see photos for the evidence of the brilliant outfits on display. At 7pm the adult entertainment started with sea shanties performed by a vocal group called "Chaos in Harmony", followed by Italian Folk Music, dance by Antonella's band 'Tambourine and Roses' and Stacks Butcher, next door, provided tasty burgers and hot dogs to the crowd. Camille O'Sullivan Live Review - James Nolan

rench-Irish singer extraordinaire, Camille O'Sullivan premiered her brand new show 'The Carny Dream' in the Mermaid in Bray recently. Having seen a quite a number of her shows before, and knowing what an absolute force of nature Camille is on stage, I knew it would be nothing short of spectacular. And I was not wrong! In this all-new production, Camille excels herself.

Singing songs by Goldfrapp, Jacques Brel, Lieber & Stoller, including a mesmerising take of the Tom Waits penned classic 'Misery is the River of the World' Camille takes us on an emotive roller coaster ride.

It is a really eclectic set with songs perfectly tailored to suit her vast vocal range, as she can go from a tender lambent whisper to a roof raising shriek in the same breath, and she also spans a wide range of emotions to match that of her voice. And her four piece band follow her lead and know exactly when to raise the crescendo or when to quieten it down.



During the show we also get songs by Nick Cave, Bob Dylan, Radiohead and Oasis. And with the exception of two numbers, it was my first time hearing her sing the remainder of the set selection, for all the newness though, this show bore all of the hallmarks that you are sure to find in a Camille performance; the warmth of her interaction with the audience, and the sense of fun she exudes as she moves around the stage and talks in-between numbers, reeling all those present in.

As the Lady herself puts it "This is a live show, Ladies and Gentlemen, and anything can happen!"

The show finishes with a wonderful version of 'Purple Rain' and then we get a couple of Bowie classics that close the evening perfectly. Needless to say, she puts her heart and soul into these songs and she had us all in the palm of her hand throughout. This unique show is a real tour de force from start to finish.

Prince Retrospective - Helen Cleary

ritney Spears drawls in her southern tones with a python heavily resting on her taut shoulders as she gyrates her tiny muscular hips, I'm a slave for you.

In 1995 Prince Rodger Neslon felt like a slave. A slave to his record company Warner Music, the word slave was written on his high cheekbones, a two finger gesture to the record company. For two years Prince was known as Symbol. Prince's first album 'For You', he boasted on the back of the cover "produced, arranged, composed and performed by Prince. He played twenty seven musical instruments.

Prince was one of the most fearless and prolific stars he sold over one hundred million records, won an Oscar and seven grammy's.

He wrote over one thousand songs including 'Manic Monday' by The Bangles, 'When you were Mine' 1985 Cyndi Lauper and 'How come



you don't call me anymore', Alicia Keyes, 2001.

My first Prince album at the age of fourteen was 'LoveSexy' which was released on May 10th 1988 by Paisley Park Records which had Alphabet Street. The cover (based on a photo by Jean Baptiste Mondino) caused some controversy upon release as it depicts Prince in the nude On the cover, a demure Prince, hand held up to his chin regally with purple and white lillies acting as a restful bed in which Prince's naked frame lay.

The theme of LoveSexy is the struggle between good and evil, or "Camille" and "Spooky Electric", respectively. God and Satan, virtue and sin (although, with the Gemini character that he developed in 1989, these "sides" may also represent "ego and alter-ego"), the perennial themes of Prince's work, mix as Prince climaxes to "Love is God, God is love, girls and boys love God above"in the song 'Anna Stesia'.

Anne Curran

"Fractured Connections" - Monday 26th Sept - Sunday 9th Oct

nne Curran is a visual artist living and working in Co Wicklow. Anne has studied in NCAD and has completed courses in many practices most recently in Sculpture and Encaustic painting. Travelling each day from a busy urban town to her studio set in an idyllic old farm in Delgany Anne had started to feel a sense of disconnection and disengagement. These



notions gave birth to her first solo show at Signal Arts Centre "Fractured Connections"

Central to Anne's work is the influence of maps and lived in spaces. There is a play between the geography of space against the age of distraction. This era of disconnection has never been so intense and so persistent as humanity is glued to data devices. We are more and more connected to a stream of information and yet increasingly we are becoming more fractured, fragile and isolated. Anne's artwork for her show is incorporating a contemporary slant to an ancient technique "Encaustic". This consists of melted beeswax combined with pigment kept molten on a heated palette. Anne uses this on delicate Asian papers and also on boards. Using delicate lines and punctured marks has enabled Anne to represent

both the disconnection and fragility. "I am using my notions of connection in works

of connection in works of natural beauty using encaustic on paper against the concept of fracture in sculptural works which are punctured and marked. This exhibition is reflecting my reaction to what is going on all around us every day noticed and unnoticed. There is a constant pull and push of distraction on our attention. My works are about the erosion of us in a space of such beauty.



My installation piece was recently awarded the NCAD ESU Grand Prize at the Annual CEAD exhibition.

My piece is called "Fractured Connections" of which I am basing my forthcoming Solo Exhibition from 26 September to 9th October this year"



uperzeros' is an exhibition of new work brought to you by Bray artist Tony Clarke, & guests, as well as his art students from St Fergal's Resource Centre, Bray.

Tony holds 2 art courses in the Resource Centre - Monday from 7-9 pm for the last 10 years, and Thursday 7-9 pm for 4 years. New members are always welcome.

Under Tony's guidance, his students have progressively improved from being complete



beginners to confident, advanced art students. Working with various mediums, including painting (with oils and acrylics), drawing and collage, they have used all the skills gained over the past few years - easily adapting to technical challenges. The resulting work is fresh, colourful and full of imagination.

"This exhibition focuses on the ability of the artist to construct from the imagination. Each artist, as well as designing an image from their own personal interests, was asked to create a 'superhero'.

As in life, the notion of a 'superhero' is a person of great strength, a person to be trusted and a person to be admired. But sometimes they miss the mark and totally fail reminiscent of maybe some or all of our politicians and other public figures who started out as heroes only to become Zeros".

raditionally, the mould was often seen as the thing that was closest to the idea and in ancient Greecewas thought of as something that gave shape and form to sensuous data. A copy is a form of an echo. To see the copy is to know that an original exists. The work in this exhibition responds to notions of replication and in particular the processes of moulding and casting that enable such repetition and reproduction. I am interested in this notion of copying and in particular what the original is and the copy becomes. Through the process of copying via the mould, there are many things that are rendered in order to produce a copy. These formed or cast things become degrees of separation, generative moments that are full of content. The copy or replica becomes a sort of fuzzy aggregate. The copy becomes complicated.

'The Secret Garden of Harmonia'

ayleen Clancy was born in New York in 1971; she has lived both in the USA and Ireland, settling in the Gaelteacht of Ring, Co. Waterford in 2000. She studied at the National College of Art & Design, Dublin, the San Francisco Art Institute, Dun Laoghaire Institute of Art, Design & Technology and Waterford Institute of Technology. She holds a NCVA Higher Dip in Visual Communications (Film Studies) and a BA Honors Degree in Art in Society.

The Secret Garden of Harmonia: Delight is tempered by hidden fears.

My work utilizes a cast of iconic figures with strong, enigmatic central protagonists, of interchangeable genders and sexualities. Just like them, the proscenium they inhabit is in a constant state of flux, fragile, shell-like and in danger of crumbling, reverberating to a half lit world populated by creatures straight out of a fairytale daydream and sometimes out of nightmares too.



The themes of the work are of loss, longing and ecstasy. The characters and their essence come and go through luminous portals observed not by humans but by the creatures who lurk in the undergrowth, ever watchful and ever present....


