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## Interview with Artist Zoe Mulvaney

# Can you tell me a little about yourself and your artistic journey?

I started to draw as a child and it was something that I did with my Mom. I currently work as a Commercial Design Artist for a firm in Dublin. Prior to this I was selected for a portfolio course in BIFE and then a four-year course in IADT. I am currently involved with the Bray Artistrs' Circle

#### How has your practice changed over time?

When I studied art in school, I found it very formal, structured, and formulaic. I prefer to be freer in my work but sometimes when I'm doing my doodles I find my mind returning to the way I was taught to work in school.

#### What is your process?

I work generally on A4 paper as it's not too big and I do not want to miss anything, which I may do if I spread it out or scaled it up. I do a pencil sketching first. If I were to draw a skull for instance good lighting is essential. I use a grid section. This will require meticulous precision. I then complete it with a ballpoint pen.




#### What themes currently inspire you?

Now it is elderly people. Particularly men I'm fascinated by their wrinkles and I find myself very focused on their noses. I tend to draw only their heads. I source the images and I find Pinterest most helpful for this.



#### What artists do you most identify with or inspire you?

Caravaggio. I love the way he plays with light and his work is emotive and there's a gothic element to it. Part of me wishes I could have met him but given what I know of him it's probably best that that could not happen. I also like Kat Von D. When I was a teenager I was obsessed with LA Ink. She is an amazing artist. Punk Zines really interest me at the moment too.



# Where is your favourite place to work and or a place that inspires you?

I like to work at home and often in the mornings, before work I will do doodles in McDonalds with a coffee. When I was on my JI I travelled a lot. I have lots of journals filled with drawings from Thailand and Cambodia.

#### Is there anything about the art world that you do not like?

I think that it can be pretentious and snobbish and very class led. If someone is from a fairly affluent background then their work is often applauded whilst often someone from a more disadvantaged background won't be. Also, often for these artists their friends would not have the same disposable income to support them.

#### What is your goal professionally?

I will always continue to work in the creative sphere. If money were not an issue I would like to work on my art and as a part time barmaid.

# Is there any advice that you've been given that you can share?

A design lecturer told me that "Anxiety is the biggest reason for procrastination". I think that this is true and that it's not laziness I often use this as a push start.

omadland, the new movie starring Frances McDormand, is an exploration of the nomadic lifestyle of those who have lost their homes and are living in camper vans. Or, as McDormand puts it in the movie, "I'm not homeless, I'm just houseless. McDormand's performance is a tour-de-force however most of the rest of the cast are not professional actors but people who are actually living the nomadic life in the USA. It's questionable whether mixing actor and non-professionals in this way paid off.

The subject of the movie is a real issue for many people who, through economic necessity, find themselves having to leave their bricks and mortar homes and live on the road and the movie takes this very seriously. If this were a documentary it would be very worthy but the problem is that the movie doesn't seem to know what it wants to be. Is it a documentary or is it a movie? It teeters on the brink of being both and perhaps because of that it doesn't seem to fulfil either as well as it should. The other mainstream recognizable actor who plays opposite McDormand is David Strathairn so when we see him in one of the scenes it's a given that he is going to play a role in the main character's life.

This is too much of a give-away and it's not a surprise when we see recurring interactions between him and McDormand. Strathairn and McDormand both give measured and deep performances and interact well with the non-professionals. However, in many scenes it seems McDormand is just here to facilitate the real people telling their story. Why not just let them tell it in a documentary and explore it fully without the fictional element added by the actors' story arc? From a cynical viewpoint, it might be said that more people would watch a movie starring McDormand than would choose to watch such a documentary. Overall, Nomadland is a good and informative film which falls short of being great because it tries too hard to be worthy.

## Vegan Choclate Brownies Recipe



Recipe
Ingredients
5 tablespoons sunflower oil, plus extra for greasing
200 g dairy-free dark chocolate
170 g self-raising flour
3 heaped teaspoons cocoa powder
180 g golden caster sugar
sea salt
1 vanilla pod
230 ml unsweetened organic soya milk
200 g pecan nuts

#### Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180°C/350°F/gas 4. Grease a square baking tin (roughly 20cm) with a little oil, then line with greaseproof paper.
- 2. Place a heatproof bowl over a pan of simmering water, making sure the base doesn't touch the water. Break 150g of chocolate into the bowl and allow it to melt, then set aside to cool slightly.
- 3. Meanwhile, sieve the flour and cocoa powder into a large bowl, then stir in the sugar and a pinch of salt. Halve the vanilla pod lengthways, scrape out the seeds, then add them to the bowl. Stir in the oil, soya milk and melted chocolate until combined.
- 4. Roughly chop and stir in the remaining chocolate and most of the pecans, reserving a few for the top. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin, spreading it out evenly. Sprinkle over the remaining pecans, then place into the hot oven for 20 to 25 minutes, or until cooked on the outside, but still gooey in the middle.
- 5. Leave to cool for around 5 minutes, turn out onto a wire cooling rack, then serve warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream, if you're feeling extra indulgent.

#### Arts in Covid by Lorna Lennon

ow does an artist make sense of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic? That's a question many creative people have been asking themselves over the past months in the face of closed galleries, theatres and other familiar outlets. Even before facing the challenges involved in selling their work many artists have had to grapple with the depression and anxiety brought about by rolling lockdowns and the isolation that resulted from social distancing policies. Through the ages creative people have responded in different ways to pandemics and natural disasters. Some have merely documented the events around them while others looked away from the chaos and chose to create cheerful life-affirming work that helped to lift the mood of others.

In 1630 the French artist, Nicolas Poussin, painted "The Plague of Ashdod" in the middle of a plague outbreak in Italy. His choice was to compare the current situation with a biblical plague in Ashdod, thus anchoring the prevalent misery in a relatable historic setting.

In 1918 the Spanish Flu raged across the world killing an estimated 50 million people and infecting over one third of the world's population. Norwegian artist, Edvard Munch, caught the flu and responded by painting himself while ill. Munch seized the chance to document what he was going through at the time thus creating a piece to which other sufferers could relate.

By contrast, some artists have used the isolation caused by difficult times not to document the difficulties but by taking the opportunity to become more productive in their work.

For example, when the bubonic plague hit Florence in 1348 writer and poet, Giovanni Boccaccio, fled to Tuscany where he wrote "The Decameron" which became a pivotal book of its time. Later, in the 17th century, when the bubonic plague was rife in London forcing theatres to close, William Shakespeare isolated himself and wrote three plays "King Lear", "Macbeth" and "Antony and Cleopatra" all within the space of a single year. Whether by documenting the experiences of themselves and others or by dedicating themselves to increasing their own productivity, artists have responded in various ways to pandemics in the past. In the next edition of the Signal Newsletter we will explore how contemporary artists are responding to the current Coronavirus pandemic.

This exhibition provides an insight into the work of an artist who has various styles and some very strong ideologies, that echo in her work. A fascination with colour and impressionism results in pointillist-like night city scenes and landscapes. The love of nature makes her explore the use of raw materials and incorporate them into her landscapes. As a keen gardener and lover of flowers she experiments with clay to reproduce life-like 3-dimentional flower canvasses, in deep edged box frames. As a lover of nature and wildlife she constantly works on reducing waste and re-uses discarded plastic and other small objects into her mixed media pieces. This process led her to the discovery of the steampunk movement and experimenting with various media and materials. All these different styles represent one artistic career, which is constantly evolving and changing, just like the world around us. ray Artists' Circle has been providing opportunities for local artists to develop their artistic talent since 2003. The members range from artists who have been painting for many years, to others who have taken it up more recently as a hobby. A cross-section of styles and media preferences from oils to watercolour, acrylics to pastels is displayed within the group. While there is no formal teaching, more experienced artists are willing to give advice as members

work on their own subject preferences in a relaxed atmosphere. Workshops led by professional artists are organised annually.


