William Caffery 'Bray Backstrand'




riginally from Dublin, I've lived in Bray for over thirty years. While always using drawing and painting, I started studying art formally in NCAD in 2016 and have expanded to a broader more contemporary approach through printmaking, sculpture and ceramics. However, drawing remains at the core of each work, irrespective of the medium.


I like the works of Irish

printmakers, Johnny Bulgar, Anthony Lyttle and the Scottish printmaker Barbara Rae.

The back strand at Bray harbour with the confrontation between nature and industrial commerce is a constant



The intention of the composition is to draw the viewer in - the central torn strip creating a tension with the deconstructed landscape and the crimson sky implying an overall darker significance to the stacked decaying containers.



Visual Artist Rachel Fallon Signal External Judicator 2022

Rachel Fallon is a visual artist who deals with themes of protection and defence in domestic realms and addresses the topic of motherhood and women's relationships to society.

Her work encompasses sculpture, drawing, photography and performance and is firmly rooted in the processes of making. As well as an individual practice, she regularly collaborates with international artists and collectives; including The Artists' Campaign to Repeal the Eight Amendment, Desperate Artwives, Grrrl Zine Fair and the Magdalene Series.

The two disparate ways of working feed into one another and are therefore equally important parts of her practice.
She is a founding member of pff publications - a feminist zine collective.
Her work is held in

public and private collections including the Arts Council of Ireland Collection, the National Museum of Ireland and the Museum of Modern Art, Warsaw.

She lives and works in Ireland.







'Equus Ferus'

The TEACHER-ARTIST PARTNERSHIP PROGRAMME

(TAP) is a unique, Creative Ireland -Department of Education and Skills initiative which commenced on a pilot basis in 2014/15; in response to the objectives outlined in the Arts in Education Charter.

Via the "Call Out for Artists" by the Arts Officer of Wicklow County Council,

I was selected to participate in this programme. This was a wonderful opportunity for me as an Artist to broaden my practice, receive training, project fees, develop creative partnerships with teachers, and transform the lives of children in Ireland.

I had a specialist, week-long training (4th – 8th July 2022) based in IADT.

It facilitated me in the unique requirements of working harmoniously in partnership with a teacher within the modern Irish classroom.

There will be a follow up in-school-residency within a local primary school to carry out a 20-hour project 14 contact hours plus 6 hours planning, preparation and evaluation) in partnership with my prospective teacher partner throughout the 2022/2023 academic year.

I am very interested in: the principles of Arts-in-Education and Creativity and to enhancing the lives of children through arts practice. I am looking forward to learning about modern classroom culture and to work in equal partnership with teachers.

I hope to combine my sense of fun, joy and collaboration with professional dedication and high artistic











Views and Reviews "Giacometti: From Life" at the NGI by Lorraine Whelan

have seen the work of Giacometti over many years in various art galleries and museums (New York, Paris, Toronto, London, etc.) and, of course, studied his work while at art school. It was especially interesting and enlightening for me to see how the joint curators (Sean Rainbird and Janet McLean from the National Gallery of Ireland, Catherine Grenier, and Thierry Pautot from Fondation Giacometti) put together this exhibition and posed a different reading of his work than the one which I had been taught at art school.

Alberto Giacometti was a Swiss artist (1901-1966) who moved to Paris and became involved with the surrealist art movement in the early 20th century. He left this group apparently after a disagreement with founder, André Breton. Giacometti returned to figuration, with portraiture being a primary



In art school I had been taught about Giacometti's affiliation with the Existentialist movement and how his work could be read with reference to Existentialism – his drawing and sculpture working the likeness of a model down to its pure physical essence. Indeed, Giacometti was friends with Jean Paul Sartre and Simone de Beauvoir but

he claimed that his interests lay in portraiture; according to Giacometti, his aim was never less than to capture the physical likeness of his subject.

Until this exhibition, which included photographs of some of the models with their portrait sculptures, I never actually recognized the individuality of each piece! Married to the idea of Existentialism as the primary influence on his work, I had always looked at his sculpture and drawings from the point of view of portraying the general essence of humanity. It was amazing to me, therefore, to look at his work from a portraiture point of view. Indeed, the photographs prove the likeness of the sculptures to the models. The artwork both captured the likeness and the essential nature of the models.

The exhibition was curated in such a way that each room dealt with a particular model (for instance his brother or his wife) and period of Giacometti's life. The various didactics brought his work to both life and relevance. The exhibition had a sparsity that allowed one to fully examine individual pieces - drawings, sculptures and photographs - without being overwhelmed, yet remaining deeply

For me, this exhibition was a real eyeopener! While I have been very familiar

with the work of Giacometti for many years, I have never looked at it from this angle before. Looking at his sculpture and drawings from the point of view of representational portraiture is both refreshing and stimulating. It has been a great surprise to me to see his work this way and, as such, points out the enduring nature of Giacometti's work. For a contemporary art audience his work is well worth a continued and astute examination.







hen I think of *I.T. today, I think of it mostly in terms of photography, and when I think of photography I think of where the image reveals itself from. When I started out in photography it was about the tiny silver halide crystals on a roll of B/W film, that changed their composition by turning black when exposed to light. *(I.T. information technology)




advancements and has changed our world of analog to this amazing use of digital, where in a language we don't have to learn, we can reach friends, relatives, search for jobs, get news, query anything, make anything, all in microseconds, instant visual imagery.

It is incredible to think that, now it is possible to have a camera set up on a tripod, (perhaps a family group portrait), you can stand in the middle of your group and arrange the group from within using your phone to view the image via the camera, then take the photos on your camera through Wi-Fi by phone, then instantly (Nano seconds) send and revealed to anyone anywhere in the world. Whew!

The development of photography was a major technological breakthrough known to the modern person, from the 1840's. This technology did not change that greatly over the developing 35/40 years, not till another modern technological breakthrough, the sending of a photo by "phototelautograph" by Professor of physics Author Korn in Munich University, of the Crown Prince William from the city of Berlin to Munich in 1907. This process took 6 minutes to complete, and the distance it was sent was 1,800 km.

1. Prof. Korn sent image 600 miles 2. Kaiser's photo first sent 1907 3. A portrait sent 2,500 miles

This technology was a breakthrough, especially when it came to press photography. Suddenly there was a reason to employ a photographer to go to places in the world and send photos of major events which could be sent by wire in a matter of minutes, rather than waiting for the artist to create an intricate etching.

Major news events could now be depicted on newspapers with full realism and from anywhere in the world, thanks to this new information technology. Though this technology was not in the hands of the ordinary people yet, and it would be a long time before that could happen. But in the interim people trusted this new information technology as governments and media would use it, through film, newsreels, radio, and newspaper.

Over the decades information technology advanced at an incredible rate but especially with the development of digital technology. The development of Digital over Analog, was key to this advancement. Analog used signals that were sent by electric pulse of varying amplitude where as digital, which is a binary format, represented by zero or one making it more accurate and

Nanosecond visual representation

A nanosecond is a SI (Internation! System of units) unit of time equal to one billionth of a second, that is, 1/1 000 000 000 of a second or 10⁻⁹ seconds. Easy.

To give some kind of understanding of this speed it is for example; 'The time it takes light to travel 1ft/30cm'!

It is, for some of us beyond revolutionary, but for those born into this mesmerising Information Technology era the question lies now about, what is real and what is made up! Can we in the future believe what we see, because our Information Technology now allows us to manipulate anything! And people sometimes take for granted, all the information to hand brought through Information Technology is true and truthful.

Therein Lies the Rub!

Denise French This Momentis Real....the Rest is just Detail

he Signal Arts Centre champions contemporary Irish artists and their forthcoming exhibition of local artist, Denise French is a great example of this. Her new collection of paintings reflecting the beauty of nature showcases her contemporary optimism and colourful view of life.

Born in Dublin, Denise grew up near the sea and always had an appreciation of its magnificence and this is reflected in this exhibition. Converting to sea swimming at age 50, she now paints evocative crashing waves in vivid colour and detail. Initially preferring to learn by example and practice, French opened her own cooperative studio. However, she went to college in her forties and completed a post grad in cultural and creative entrepreneurship during Covid.

As an artist, she is constantly evolving, always positive and pushing forward and this is hugely reflected in this collection. There

reflected in this collection. There is always a whole story behind each painting. Vivid, striking, and playful, French's unique perspective and textured style is a result of her diverse inspirations.

She is forever inspired by the everchanging muse of nature and the glory of it whether it's the sea or a summer meadow. The realism of her designs and textures often makes her flat-surface paintings appear three-dimensional. Her September exhibition at the Signal Arts Centre in Bray is sure to delight collectors. They will love a collection inspired by nature infused with the energy of the moment in which they were created.

Yvonne Pettitt

'Nature'

Monday, October 10th Sunday, October 23rd

Vonne Pettitt's paintings incorporate the traditional abstract practices of painting. They are painted 'alla prima' and modified. The aim is to draw the viewer in though constructing non-verbal visual spaces using compositional design, form, light and colour. The landscapes are not dramatic as in the sublime awe of nature of the Romantic Period in Art but more on the Classical Beauty of nature as it still yet, exists for us in the contemporary world.

This is a nature managed in terms of agriculture and cultural issues including conservation. Looking at nature now, climate change is always in the background lurking. 'But I don't want to lecture, rather to celebrate: Yellow Field is nature harnessed. I was

struck by the unnaturalness of the yellow, a more recent arrival in the Irish scape. Yet it is beautiful, the field of colour lent itself to be painted large and impressionistically.



Turnips for me is the opposite of status symbolising still-life but humble. Figurative paintings concern interior thought and connections.'

Yvonne taught Art History for 20 years and now is a full-time painter. 'I have always been particularly interested and drawn to ancient traditions

to see how they sit in contemporary times. To be able to interact with oil paint is a passion and privilege.'

Caitriona Ní Threasaigh

aitríona Ní Threasaigh's Dare To Roam exhibition is inspired by Paul Klee's definition of drawing i.e., 'taking a line for a walk'.

Working instinctually and using colour and line as the impulse, this work uncovers an imaginative environment populated with figures that range from the grotesque, sinister and distorted to the appealing, mischievous, and playful. These characters provide a means to encounter the absurd and fantastical elements of the creative imagination and act as an entry point into the unconscious mind's way of dealing with issues such as love, loss, friendship, fear and death.



'Dare to Roam'

The sculptures are created in the same streamof-consciousness way using a wide variety of found objects ranging from fabric, bone, hair, gems, among others.

Caitríona's graduation show (NCAD 2004) gained a special mention from Aidan Dunne and she won the Emerging Artist award in Claremorris Open the same year.

She exhibited in EVA, Limerick in 2006. She has travelled far and wide and has exhibited her work in Ireland, New York and Ulaanbattar, Mongolia. Caitríona has also worked in other creative fields, namely dyeing and ageing costumes for film and theatre. She is also a professional actor and her passion for creativity and drama is evident in all of her artistic pursuits.

Matea Brekalo

'Equua Ferus'

atea Brekalo is a Dublin-based artist in Ireland. In addition to figurative art, she deals with abstraction, anatomy, still life, and landscapes. Her art is not limited to one medium, style, and concept. Matea has a Master's degree in Painting from the Academy of Arts University Mostar, Bosnia and Herzegovina, 2013 and she is a Visual Arts Teacher. Her work is held in public and private collections in Europe. The artist chooses the motif of a wild horse, after which she named her solo exhibition "Equus Ferus". The body of a noble horse animal is its inspired drawing starting point. On the canvases, there is an observation, imbued with her own imagination, guided by a sure hand, with a strong stroke of the brush she builds a form of her own animalism.

The tension and contrasting values of the line which are

clean, vivid contours are broken and softened by surfaces of a clear tone, impasto, or azure but almost always it seems there is a complete absence of colour. Asymmetry within the composition leads to displacement and tension from blurred sections in the background distance, to those sharp foreground details, thus achieving dominance and maximum contrast within the format.


