Kelly Hood showcases her new collection of cows on canyas.

While Ireland has had its fair share of sacred cows in recent times, the spiritual nature of cattle and their aesthetic beauty is now captured on canvas in a unique solo show by artist Kelly Hood. In this show she draws out the individual characteristics of her bovine subjects to humorous, affectionate and dramatic effect. Hood investigates; The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly behind "Selfie" Culture.

'Selfie" is defined as a photograph that one has taken of oneself, typically taken with a smartphone and shared via social media.

Opinions surrounding selfies have always been divided. Some believe that taking selfies can be harmful as it could promote narcissism, unrealistic physical expectations, and eventual comparisons. # Lorna Lennon Night to Day

Date: 16th to 29th October **Opening:** Thursday 19th October, 7pm – 9pr

"Night to Day" is an exhibition of contrasts. In it, Lorna explores the juxtaposition of light and dark as they play out in urban and landscape locations.

These semi-abstract watercolours move from the darker settings of buildings against evening skies, often showcasing the dance of light on water, to the brighter paintings capturing sunlight on landscapes and flow-Using watercolour and mixed media Lorna balances techniques such as the Japanese light-blurring effect of

bokeh, as well as paper scratching and spritzing to achieve a range of visual effects with tools such as twigs, plastic cards and skewers as well as traditional watercolour brushes. The interplay of light and shade has been a continuing inspiration for Lorna with the movement of light on

water being a particular motif in her work.

Lorna is a Bray artist and art teacher, and is currently the Exhibition Co-Ordinator at Signal Arts Centre.

### lathalie Carnec • Magdolna Toth NETWORKS

Date: 31st October to 12th Nove

For "Networks", Magdolna Toth has created sculptures capturing the concepts of overlapping grids and global networks that connect us, using the medium of paper porcelain which she moulds into intricate lattice frameworks, embodying the delicate balance between vulnerability and strength. Her work is tied to worldwide networks – each intersection of a sculpture represents a node in a vast network, reminding us of our interconnectedness and prompting reflection on collective impact.

Nathalie Carnec responds to Magda's alveolar paper clay grid by exploring a similar 3D structure which she then distorts using the principles of origami. The tactile quality of the materials is essential to her work, where she employs folding techniques with paper and industrial plastics to create organic, almost sensual expressions. Nathalie also uses video and digital tools to further extend her vision.

How often do you truly look around you or really notice the detail of a building or streetlamp? Capturing the essence of an area is central to Lisa Keegan's work. The 'Snapshots' series consists of vibrant yet minimalistic compilation paintings. These paintings use various

panels to reflect different aspects and views of the built environment of a particular area.

Using social media as well as traditional sketchbook methods allows Lisa Keegan to incorporate the feeling for and views of an area, creating a work which is enduring as well as being immediate and current.



"Our project is a collaborative, multidimensional process, begun in 2020 and in constant evolution. Coming from different disciplines and creative approaches, our metamorphic process explores the potential and power for transformation in a rapidly changing world. We spent time where we could in nature, and natural cycles became an inspiration, as well as the concept of creating collections from nature, so beloved of the Victorians. The work comprises a 2-dimensional Victorian Hang including visual work from all four artists, a soundscape, a cabinet of curiosities and a collection of 3D objects.

Our interactive workshop will create an intimate, meditative space. It will include live, improvised music as well as a deeper experience of the soundtrack, with opportunities for the public to respond creatively.

Four key concepts represent our explorations: seed, egg, meander, and feminine energy. The work records our response to contemporary issues, and our dialogues as we got to know each other. By the end, each of us had contributed both visual and audio work to the final piece: a wonderful alchemy that leaves us all richer both as


### Hello fellow Signal(l)ers



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# SIGNAL ARTS CENTRE

S.O.S. Save Our Signal

As many of you who have been in Signal and used its facilities know, our building is not the most modern. It is a very cold building which is a potential health risk to many in our community. It has no double glazing or insulation and costs a fortune to heat.

Most people only know us through our fortnightly Exhibitions but behind the Gallery is a very busy visual arts space. The Back of House includes 2 general workshop rooms, a ceramics workspace, artist's studio, IT room, a small office, storage for artworks and an outdoor performance/workspace. These workspaces are accessed by a variety of individuals and community groups, including professional and emerging artists, youth, and disability groups.

Here's a little flavour of what happens in Signal beyond its Exhibitions:

- Weekly Classical Drawing Classes.
- Weekly Life Drawing Workshops
- Weekly Ceramics Workshops x 4
- Kiln Firings & Assistance for professional artists and youth services.
- Signal Sunday Sketchers
- Weekly Papillion Art Group Meet & Workshop.
- Open Studio x 2 days per week for residents and users of Carmona Services, Rehab Care, Sunbeam and more.

In addition, individual artists and creatives use the Centre to run their own classes and workshops and include fortnightly Musician jam sessions, Poetry and writing evenings, Film nights and occasional performance art events.

Over 17 artists and art workers work in the building facilitating workshops, invigilating the exhibitions, providing administrative support, working on a variety of projects around North Wicklow and ensuring that the centre is safe, inclusive, and welcoming.

The studio is accessed by four artists a year, and supports offered to member and non-member artists include providing individual advice on grant writing, cv development and mentoring.

All this is done in the cold!

And sometimes the wet (the roof occasionally leaks...)
